SUMMERTIDE?

The Christian Liturgical Year is pretty organized—even in the Reformed Tradition, which does not include as many special celebrations or saints days on its calendar. From winter through spring the Church seasons come and go pretty fast. Advent. Christmas. Epiphany. Lent. Easter. Pentecost Sunday. But then comes the long, long season we are in now from June through November. This is a season which is hardly broken or punctuated by special dates. It just goes on and on for half the year.

As I have grown up in the Methodist and Lutheran and now the Presbyterian traditions, I have heard this long season we are in now referred to by several names. The Methodists of the 1950s and 60s call this season "Kingdomtide." Lutherans call the season "Pentecost." The Presbyterian Book of Worship calls the season, "Ordinary Time."

"Tide" was the old fashioned English word or word ending that meant time. It also indicated the time of development and change, as in the flow of tides. So we might talk about season we are in now as "Pentecost-time," or "Spirit-time," meaning "time to live in the Spirit"! We might call the season "Kingdom-Time," meaning time to live in the spirit of the prayer that Jesus taught us, in the spirit of the Kingdom of God that Jesus announced was arriving, right down here on earth, the Kingdom of Love and Peace and Justice, as defined by the words and deeds of Jesus.

In the spirit of that miraculously-coming and Divinely-sent kingdom we might call these days "Ordinary time." But when we do we certainly do not mean "ordinary" in the worldly sense of "boring," or "same ole, same ole," or "normal" in the sense "the more things change, the more they stay the same." It never means "the dog-days of summertide."

The "Ordinary time" of the new season that God creates is the sending the kingdom of heaven down to earth. It is the time of the New Creation. "Behold, look at what I am doing now! I am making all things NEW!"

God's "new ordinary" is God's gift of resurrection, renewal, new birth, new living coming home to us! God's new ordinary time is our time of new growing, increasing and maturing in the wisdom and uprightness that God gives to us now. "Behold! The kingdom of God is within you!" In God in Christ in the Spirit we are not only invited, but also empowered to live ordinarily as extraordinarily new!

God's new season for us is not just to be named, but lived! Live it up! Live it out!

\$300.00 to the Crisis Food Center to purchase canned fruit which is not usually donated. Also in the last newsletter I neglected to put in the numbers for Mitten Sunday. We collected 34 hats, 31 pairs of gloves and 4 scarves. The Deacons do not meet in June, July and August.
